Thomas

Do you feel just a bit sorry for Thomas? Along with the other apostles, he has followed Jesus through thick and thin, in dangerous times. The occupying Roman army maintained order in brutal ways, and he had seen vivid evidence of that just a few days earlier. Three men had been crucified, one of them Jesus, whom he had learned to trust. Now, after he has ventured out after the horrors of that event, he returns to his place of relative safety in the company of his friends, to he told "We have seen the Lord!"

What would you have thought? If I had been in a sympathetic frame of mind, I might have thought, "Poor souls! They are seeing what they want to see, and can't accept the facts; he is dead! We saw what he had had to undergo. No-one could have survived that in any case, but the final stab into his side will have left no doubt." However much he wanted it to be different, he knew Jesus was dead.

Thomas is the one who has acquired the soubriquet of "Doubting Thomas", and with it by implication the disapproval of believers down the ages. But ask yourself what you would have thought in similar circumstances. We are constantly being advised not to take anything on face value, but to test it out against the evidence of experience.

If we are to do this, we have to look for the evidence. I can see my own father's reliance on his Saviour, despite the harshness of his own life. If we look at the lines from Hebrews, when the writer speaks of, and names, some of the "great crowd of witnesses", we may be prompted to seek them. There are many whom you will be able to remember - people whose simple goodness has had its effect on what you are. I owe much to a host of people whose faith, service and testimony have fed into my experience.

The tradition is that Thomas became a missionary to India, though it is not easy to find actual proof of this. Whatever the facts, he is evidence that it is possible for us to redeem our earlier failings. That will do for me.

Then Jesus told him, “Because you have seen me, you have believed; blessed are those who have not seen and yet have believed.”

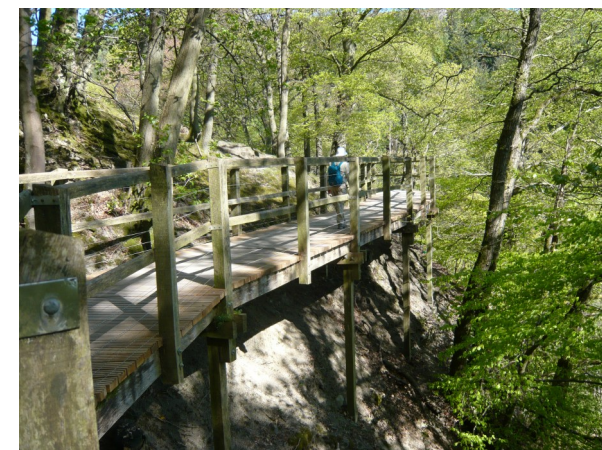
