Do not stumble

I have always liked this passage written by Minnie Louise Haskins, quoted in the Christmas Day broadcast message by King George VI.

And I said to the man who stood at the gate of the year, "Give me a light that I may tread safely into the unknown"

And he replied: "Go out into the darkness and put your hand into the hand of God. That shall be to you better than light and safer than a known way."

So I went forth, and finding the hand of God, trod gladly into the night. And He led me towards the hills and the breaking of day in the lone East.

My own night vision has always been rather poor, and I have memories of night-time journeys I have made. It calls for a certain degree of courage or is it foolhardiness? - to step out boldly into the dark way ahead. When I was a Boys' Brigade officer our young men took part in Night Pilot as part of their Duke of Edinburgh award. This involved a night time period of route-finding in the dark in and around the woodland in Normanby Park. As one of their assessors I had to appear at various rendezvous points to check on the accuracy of their reading. You will have heard about the blind leading the blind.

We are sometimes called upon to take our courage into both hands and venture out into the unknown. The results can often surprise us. I have spoken before of the apparent chance which brought me to the Isle, when the post I had applied for had been filled, but I was invited to try for the one in South Axholme. I've never regretted the decision to step out into the unknown

We as a church often need to take a step into the unknown. Discussion and careful planning are needed, of course, but sometimes it is important to make quick decisions and to act decisively. The clever thing, if we can manage it, is to know when to consider and when to act.

As for you, always be sober, endure suffering, do the work of an evangelist, carry out your ministry fully.
