**Fruit** In the garden of the old house we had before moving to our present bungalow was a gigantic Bramley apple tree. Faithfully each year it gave us a magnificent crop which led me to risk life and limb climbing the tree to harvest the entire crop, and then to store stones of apples carefully wrapped and packed into shallow trays and boxes and placed on the rafters of our garage, a former wheelwright's workshop. They would see us through the winter, despite our passing on loads to family and friends. Many would be baked into pies, to go into the large chest freezer in the garage. This was in addition to the dessert apples also in the garden, some of which I planted myself.

Following our move to our present newly-built home I felt compelled to plant apple trees here, though I ensured they were all grafted on to dwarf stock, and carefully trained into cordons. The harvest is reduced, but so is the labour, and most years the crop will see us through a few months of careful use.

I wonder what those of our preachers who follow the appointed lectionary will have to say on Sunday. I imagine that we may hear reference to Matthew 7:20 "By their fruits ye shall know them." Oh dear! I don't know about you, but I find that a bit scary. When I judge myself it is along the lines of what I **intended** to do, rather than on what I **did** do. When I consider my own position, I can only hope that others might be just as forgiving of my failings.

The Galatians verse quoted in the inside flap of these notices is one I commend it to you, in the hope that you will take it as St. Paul intended - an encouragement rather than an accusation. Some of those reading this will also be reminded of those happy days when we were able to mount the Salvation Army Musical Spirit here in Wesley. I shall attach a link to a clip when I mail the notices to all who receive their notices electronically, with apologies to any who only receive the printed a copy.

For all of us, it is well to remember what St Paul had to say about his ministry to the church in Corinth:

I planted the seed, Apollos watered it, but God has been making it grow. I Cor 3:6

May we be given the grace to yield the fruit of the Spirit in our lives.

#### The Orange


At lunchtime I bought a huge orange -The size of it made us all laugh. I peeled it and shared it with Robert and Dave -


They got quarters and I had a half.


