'Journeying' is quite an accurate description for my sabbatical experience. Journeying spiritually through reading and prayer. Journeying physically through my walks exploring more of Lincolnshire.

I have tried to give a potted summary of my sabbatical experience in the form of the A-Z below:

A is for ADVENT – It was great to begin sabbatical with this time of personal reflection trying to understand more of the mystery of 'God with us.'

B is for BOOKS – How blessed I was to be loaned plenty of books to keep my 'little grey cells' stimulated.

C is for CAROLS – Christmas isn't Christmas without the Carols!

D is for DOG WALKS – Even though she is getting more senior in years now, hopefully our dog appreciated me having more time to take her out for walks.

E is for ECUMENICAL SERVICES — Participating in congregational worship during my sabbatical had an ecumenical flavour, broadening my experience of prayer and worship.

F is for FAMILY & FRIENDS – My family had to get used to me being about more; a mixed blessing maybe!

G is for GOSPEL – Day by day I have tried to notice 'good news' around me- whether in the natural world or in scriptural promises.

H is for 'HUSH THE NOISE' – Like some of you I found it fruitful to engage with the Methodist Connexional Advent resources.

I is for INTERCESSION FOR THE CIRCUIT & OTHERS — Having been offered the privilege of a sabbatical, I wasn't totally cut off from the Circuit, as I remembered you all in prayer.

J is for JOURNAL – I don't routinely follow the practice of keeping a Journal. (A different thing to a diary!) My sabbatical journal was a good place to record thoughts and ideas.

K is for KINDNESS – I have been grateful for the kindness of others in the staff, circuit leadership team and local churches that enabled me to benefit from sabbatical time.

L is for LISTENING – The sabbatical reinforced for me my conviction of the value of time spent listening to God and neighbours.

M is for MISSING PEOPLE – Naturally over the 3 months I did members of my circuit family!

N is for NOW – With a diary less packed with dates I was able to appreciate more being 'in the now'.

O is for OPEN – Whether it was inside the covers of a new book or out on one of my walks I was conscious of the need to be open to fresh encounters and new inspiration.

P is for PILGRIMAGE WALKS – I have another A-Z of them, so you will have to ask me for more details!

Q is for QUIET – This one probably links with the next one...

R is for RECHARGE – 3 months gives a healthy amount of time to recharge one's batteries.

S is for SUPERVISION STUDY – All ordained ministers and many lay pastoral staff are required by Connexion to undertake Supervision. This means they need Supervisors. I am a Supervisor to 3 people in

our District. It was helpful to do some reading updating myself on current practices in Supervision

T is for TRAVEL - You don't have to travel far to get the benefits of a change of scenery.

U is for UNIQUE - Each ministers sabbatical is unique because each minister is different.

V is for VARIETY – Sometimes we get fixed in habitual patterns and sabbatical time allows the freedom to change and experiment.

W is for WONDER - Whether it be wonder at the mystery of the Incarnation or at the dew drops on spiders webs wonder is a capacity that we can neglect when we live our lives in a rush.

X is for EXTRA – Receiving extra awareness of God's presence has been a bonus.

Y is for YES – When the Angel Gabriel visited Mary to reveal God's plan that she would give birth to our Saviour, she was brave enough to say 'Yes'. Finding the daily courage to say 'Yes' to serving God is a call on us as 21st century disciples too. The Covenant service provides a chance for us to respond in this way.

Z is for Zzz - Resting after a good walk with tea & biscuits has been a luxury not to be taken for granted.

And here we are in June, season of Pentecost, a reminder of God's Spirit that is always with us wherever we go and whatever we do. What gospel adventures may God's Spirit be calling us, our local churches, our Circuit, our District to engage with in the months ahead?

Book reviewby Hazel Jackson

Some of you who know me well, will know I read *true crime books*? I have a fascination for real crime; I watch programmes and enjoy TV dramas based on true events. I've been asked many times why and what is the attraction? They are not everybody's choice of reading material as many are heartbreaking, emotional, gruesome but also fascinating to read how people's faith and hope in justice remained strong and belief and trust in God never wavered.

Each book I've read provides an insight, or not in some cases, to the evils of our world, which I fear we will never get to grips with, and historical, the social and psychological backgrounds of perpetrators, and, or victims as often this played a big part in why crimes were committed and tells of how people are driven by perversion, greed, power lust, hate, sex or evil.



I do not believe in the devil, but I believe people have the propensity of evil, and those who choose this path, do unspeakable acts of horror without conscience or compassion.

Each book is about real life, and how lives are changed, through no fault of their own, and how they have found themselves challenging bureaucracy and the authorities, fighting for justice for their loved ones, in some cases for many years.

As each story is real life, there are also the cover ups, mistakes, decisions made to protect those in power, or murderers, or abusers; the miscarriages of justice where racism, sexism and homophobia has

resulted in innocent people sent to prison when the police and justice system fails them.

I'd love to write about every book I've read, especially over the past 2-3 years. I have a collection of 60+ books but one thing for me, is how those in the very depths of despair, keep going, keep focused and move mountains. How church and religion kept them strong. How, out of darkness and the awfulness of situations we can't imagine, mothers, fathers, families fought the system, and got it changed as a legacy to their loved ones and a future benefit for all.

Sara Payne MBE is known for her campaign for parents' right for a controlled access to the sex offender registry, "Sarah's Law" was driven by the murder of her daughter Sarah in 2000.

Ann Ming MBE created legal history after spending 17 years relentlessly worked to overturn the 800-year-old double jeopardy law, which prevented people being tried twice for the same offence. Ann and her husband, Charlie campaigned to get the law changed. In 2006, Billy Dunlop was finally jailed for life for the 1989 murder of her daughter Julie Hogg. The double jeopardy rule played a massive part also, in bringing the perpetrators who murdered Stephen Lawrence to justice.

Marie McCourt MBE led a campaign to change the law after her daughter was killed after vanishing near their home in St Helens, Merseyside in 1988. Marie campaigned to deny killers parole for failing to tell the location of their victims' remains.

The Prisoners (Disclosure of Information About Victims) Act "Helen's Law" came into force in 2021, a few months too late for Helen's perpetrator, paroled, but died never telling where he had hidden her body.

Dame Dorreen Lawrence OBE whose son Stephen was murdered by a racist gang in 1993, along with her husband (they have since divorced) challenged the Metropolitan Police investigation. After years of campaigning, in 1999 a judicial inquiry was established to

investigate the circumstances of Stephen's death and concluded that the Metropolitan Police was "institutionally racist", this being one of the primary causes of their failure to solve the case. Dorreen continues to campaign for justice for all victims of racist crime and founded the Stephen Lawrence Charitable Trust. She has worked to secure further reforms of the police service too.

Denise Fergus tormented that she briefly let go of her toddler's hand, endured a breakdown, abuse, press intrusion, she continues to campaign and fight the system to ensure one of the killers of her toddler son, James Bulger, remains in prison. Jon Venables, has twice reoffended since killing James, applied for parole and could be free by the end of the year. Denise said recently "we are still here, we haven't forgiven, and we will never give up. I believe he will kill again if he is given any kind of freedom."

Jim Swire Father of Flora, who was on PAN AM flight 103 blown up over Lockerbie on 21 December 1988. His dogged determination, his will to see justice done not only for Flora and all the other innocent victims on the plane, including the 4 CIA agents on the plane, and to "out" the USA and UK governments for the cover-up of the true perpetrators behind the terrorist bombing.

I recommend you read Jim's book "A father's search for justice" for yourselves, and "Cover Up of Convenience, the hidden scandal of Lockerbie" by two very established reporters to fully understand that from the night the plane went down, the real story has been hidden from the public.

I'd love to share more stores and insights with you, as these are just the tip of the iceberg, but there'll be another time.

One thing I am sure about, we are and must continue to be, a justice seeking Church. Methodist voices must be heard; we have to stand up and speak out where there is greed, poverty, racism, homophobia, hate and injustice. If we don't, we become complicit in the very nature of those awful blights on our society.

Matthew 17:20. "and he said to them, because you have so little faith, truly I tell you, if you have faith as small as a mustard seed, you can say to this mountain, 'Move from here to there,' and it will move. Nothing will be impossible for you."

Best of all, God is with us, always, in all places, in all things...and we can move mountains.

are reasonably similar and, if completed, will see a completely refurbished kitchen, an increase in the space of the hall and a new unisex toilet. A meeting between members of the Church, Laughton Parish Council and West Lindsey District Council approved the quotes and are now working on putting together a funding application. This will take some time and will involve obtaining approval from parishioners, which hopefully will be forthcoming. The Schoolroom doubles as a village hall, there being no alternative building in the village. It is hoped that work will be able to commence in July.

Meanwhile, April, May and June are busy times for the Church and for the Schoolroom. As well as Sunday services on the first Sunday of the month, there are meetings organised for Laughton Parish Council, for the Neighbourhood Development Plan, the Election of councillors to

Lincolnshire County Council and the Mayoral Election for Greater Lincolnshire, the assistance to the village for VE Day celebrations, the two-day West Lindsey Churches



Festival, and the 98th Church Anniversary celebrations and supper. For help with the latter, we are very grateful to our friends at Yaddlethorpe Methodist Church.

So, thankfully, work never stops at our little church in deepest Lincolnshire. But we are always grateful for any support and always look forward to seeing our friends from the Circuit and the wider church.

"My days as a school governor in South London over 50 years ago were some of the


most rewarding in my life. I strongly recommend service in this form to those seeking to get involved in their local communities in a practical and useful way."



21. The Barren Fig Tree

Luke 13:6-9 AMP

And He told them this parable: A certain man had a <u>fig</u> tree, planted in his vineyard, and he came <u>looking</u> for <u>fruit</u> on it, but did not find [any].

So he said to the <u>vinedresser</u>, See here! For these <u>three years</u> I have come looking for fruit on this fig tree and I find none. <u>Cut</u> it <u>down</u>! Why should it <u>continue</u> also to use up the <u>ground</u> [to <u>deplete</u> the <u>soil</u>, <u>intercept</u> the <u>sun</u>, and take up <u>room</u>]?

But he replied to him, <u>Leave</u> it <u>alone</u>, sir, [just] this one more year, till I dig <u>around</u> it and put <u>manure</u> [on the soil].

Then perhaps it will <u>bear</u> fruit after this; but if not, you can cut it down and out.

Luke 13:6-9 CEV

Jesus then told them this story:

A man had a fig tree <u>growing</u> in his vineyard. One day he went out to <u>pick</u> some figs, but he didn't find any. So he said to the <u>gardener</u>, "For three years I have come looking for figs on this tree, and I haven't <u>found</u> any yet. <u>Chop</u> it down! Why should it take up space?"

The gardener answered, "Master, leave it for <u>another</u> year. I'll dig around it and put some manure on it to make it grow. Maybe it will have figs on it <u>next</u> year. If it doesn't, you can have it cut down."


