From the desk of ESG Circuit Safeguarding Officer

The first of our Spring flowers has appeared this week ... a mustard seed (Matthew 13:31) compared to the taller and more vibrant daffodils and tulips and the Summer flowers that grace our gardens as the months progress- yet this tiny white flower is a flower o, 'Hope' and 'Purity.' Hope, that dark nights and the cold and wet days will soon be behind us and that Spring is on its way... Purity in its whiteness and freshness, a new beginning. The tiny flower is a survivor, strong and resilient in all weathers. Similarly, Safeguarding in our churches has grown from nowhere into a snowdrop, a tiny flower of hope, resilience and strength.

I want to say a big thankyou to everyone who has contributed to positive Safeguarding practice in this circuit.

(Luke6:45-49) For people who experience any type of abuse, it can be like having their foundations taken away from them. We hear from victims and survivors of abuse that abuse alters perceptions of people and the world and can be a whole life sentence. Resilience is affected, foundations battered.

Our churches need to be as safe as possible, We need to 'talk up' Safeguarding, display evidence that we take Safeguarding seriously here and listen when someone tells their story and be supportive when truth is spoken to power.

In 2012, the Methodist church was aware that action was needed to address abuse in all of its forms and bravely put in place a research project called 'Courage, Cost and Hope,' to investigate and learn from 1,800 past cases of abuse brought to the attention of the church and

from the church's response to supporting victims and survivors of abuse. Only 57% of cases were formally reported which meant a staggering 43% were not and the victims and survivors remained unsupported. This report was published in 2015 and is available on the Methodist Church website. On the morning of the publication, Dr Martyn Atkin offered a formal apology on behalf of the Methodist Church to people who had been let down by the church in the past. On that morning, the BBC were very critical of the Methodist Church's self-investigation. By 10.00 that evening, the Methodist church was praised for its courage in owning past mistakes and moving forward towards making our churches safer spaces for worship.

The lessons learned have influenced the 'Creating Safer Space,' practice that has developed over the past ten years and the inclusion of the perspective of survivors has altered the way in which we, 'Respond well,' by recording and reporting all safeguarding incidents centrally. Doing nothing is a decision, but not a defensible decision. Therefore, doing nothing when someone bravely shares their story is not an option.

Our churches are grateful to brave survivors who continue to influence the Safeguarding decision- making of our policies and procedures, thus creating safer spaces for worship.

Yet we cannot be complacent. The Independent Inquiry into Child Sexual Abuse (IICSA), published in October 2022, identified that there is more work to be done.

'Safeguarding is about the action the Church takes to promote a safer culture. It is integral to the mission of the Methodist church and is a part of its response and witness to the love of God in Christ.'

According to our policy, Safeguarding is also everyone's responsibility and is the responsibility of each church council.

Each church must have a named Safeguarding Officer who, in this circuit, is invited to be part of the circuit Safeguarding group which meets twice a year to catch up with new initiatives and expectations.

Just before Advent began, our church safeguarding officers were invited to a meeting in which we discussed the need for,' Safer Recruitment' to be embedded in our practice. This will mean that from now, all role holders will be asked to sign a 'Self Declaration,' (Updated January 2024.) Role outlines will be given to everyone who has a role in the church showing the training required for each role and the level of DBS check (or none) related to each role. DBS checks are required for the people in roles defined in Appendix 9 of the Methodist Safeguarding Policy updated in July2023.

All members of CLT are required to have DBS checks and all trustees of church councils are now required to have DBS checks at the enhanced level without barring.

Role outlines identify who requires a DBS check and at what level. Exemplar role outlines will be added to the Lincolnshire District Methodist Website in due course.

All roles that are with children and young people require a DBS check and Foundation training.

All pastoral visitors are now required to have foundation Safeguarding training.

All roles that require DBS checks can only be confirmed when the DBS certificate has been seen by the church safeguarding officer and is free of blemishes.

Many of us are required to take part in, 'Unconscious Bias,' Training, this now includes members of the church council, circuit meeting representatives and Local Preachers and Worship Leaders.

Safeguarding is not an 'add on' but is part of a 'Methodist way of Life' a tiny, brave and resilient flower stating proudly that there is hope and a tomorrow and even brighter and more vivid flowers will come. Like the mustard seed, Safeguarding is growing into a tall tree, golden, threaded through everything that we do.

As many of you may already be aware, Christian Aid turns 80 this year. Their work began in 1945 as the British and Irish churches helped refugees following the Second World War. Throughout these 80 years, the charity have provided humanitarian relief and long-term development support for the poorest communities throughout our world. They continue to give us all opportunities to help tackle injustice and suffering by the tireless campaigns they highlight.

Christian Aid are offering a 6 week course for Lent this year encouraging us to explore 'Act on Poverty'. Session 1 (Prophetic) Find and nurture your prophetic voice. Session 2 (Broken) How we can join God's work of healing divisions. Session 3 (Generous) How we can be generous in challenging times. Session 4 (Located) Where you think Jesus would place himself in your community?

Session 5 (Hopeful) How do we develop practices of hope? Session 6 (Together) Create your Act on Poverty Plan.

Old Brumby United Church Festival of Christmas Trees 2024

For the 20th year (with only 2 years when either Snow, or Covid, caused it to be cancelled) we hosted the Scunthorpe Rotary Festival of Christmas Trees, which is appreciated by many.



This year we hosted 72 trees and were open to the public over 5 days (the weekends of 8th/9th December

and Friday/Saturday/Sunday 14th/15th/16th December. During those hours there were 400-500 visitors, 16 choirs, or groups providing entertainment, and during the week there were 3 visits from local primary schools.

On the second weekend I had the honour of leading a Christingle Service on Saturday 15th at 4:30pm as well as leading the Civic Service on 16th with Cllr Carol Ross, the Deputy Mayor of North Lincolnshire Council, and her consort, Ms Rachael Watchorn in attendance, along with the Rotary District Governor Richard Greenwood of Yorkshire and Northern Lincolnshire District of Rotary International 1040. Also with us were the 16th Scunthorpe Uniformed Groups who, as usual, were keen to help me with my Gospel Magic!

Over the 2 weekends the Festival raised over £2000 to be shared between Lindsey Lodge Hospice and Macmillan Cancer Support, they also had their own stalls and money was raised there also.

The refreshments (run by Sue Sanderson and family along with a small band of helpers) raised £1900 towards our own Church funds.

It is difficult to believe that the Festival has run over 20 years since Rev. Brian Bailey suggested it in 2004 and the Church extends their gratitude to all of the Rotary and Church volunteers who work tirelessly over the Festival but, particularly, to George Jefferson who has organises each year (along with, until recently, his late wife Sue) since the beginning and has brought unique displays ranging from Cycling Santa to replica 60s sweet shop windows!

For anyone who has not yet visited (difficult to imagine) let me say it is a real treat and a wonderful beginning to the Advent season.

- · We will share our faith with others.

70. Blessings

Galatians 3:5-11 NLT

I ask you again, does God give you the <u>Holy Spirit</u> and <u>work miracles</u> among you because you obey the law? Of <u>course</u> not! It is because you believe the message you <u>heard about Christ</u>.

In the same way, "<u>Abraham</u> believed God, and God <u>counted</u> him as <u>righteous</u> because of his <u>faith</u>." The real <u>children</u> of Abraham, then, are those who put their faith in God.

What's more, the Scriptures looked <u>forward</u> to this time when God would declare the <u>Gentiles</u> to be righteous because of their faith. God <u>proclaimed</u> this good news to Abraham long ago when he said, "All nations will be blessed through you." So all who put their faith in Christ share the same blessing Abraham received because of his faith.

But those who depend on the law to <u>make</u> them right with God are under his <u>curse</u>, for the Scriptures say, "Cursed is everyone who does not <u>observe</u> and obey all the <u>commands</u> that are written in God's Book of the Law." So it is clear that no one can be made <u>right</u> with God by trying to keep the law. For the Scriptures say, "It is through faith that a righteous <u>person</u> has <u>life</u>."

This way of faith is very <u>different</u> from the way of law, which says, "It is through <u>obeying</u> the law that a person has life."

But Christ has <u>rescued</u> us from the curse pronounced by the law. When he was hung on the cross, he <u>took</u> upon himself the curse for our wrongdoing. For it is written in the Scriptures, "Cursed is <u>everyone</u> who is <u>hung</u> on a <u>tree</u>." Through Christ Jesus, God has blessed the Gentiles with the same blessing he <u>promised</u> to Abraham, so that we who are believers might receive the promised Holy Spirit through faith.


